Observations

- In the first call it is essential to achieve a minimum of 4.5 out of 10, in the exam to be able to compute the other two concepts (Attendance and favorable participation, as well as a favorable attitude in the subject and the other percentage, practices)
- In the second call, only the exam grade is taken into account.
- In relation to "attendance, active participation and a favorable attitude", mere attendance only represents 5% of the total of this percentage. The other 15% corresponds to the active participation that can be carried out both in the intervention in the class, raising doubts and answers on the merits, and through the forum, emails, tutorials.
- The pass will only be the result of obtaining a grade equal to or greater than 5.



MENTION OF DISTINCTION:

According to Article 22 of the Regulations governing the Evaluation and Qualification of UCV Courses, the mention of "Distinction of Honor" may be awarded by the professor responsible for the course to students who have obtained, at least, the qualification of 9 over 10 ("Sobresaliente"). The number of "Distinction of Honor" mentions that may be awarded may not exceed five percent of the number of students included in the same official record, unless this number is lower than 20, in which case only one "Distinction of Honor" may be awarded.

Learning activities

The following methodologies will be used so that the students can achieve the learning outcomes of the subject:

- M1 Group work sessions supervised by the teacher. Study of legal cases, both true and fictitious. Significant construction of knowledge through student interaction and activity. Critical analysis of values and social commitment.
- M5 The students must be familiarized with the institutions where this branch of Law is applied on a daily basis.
- M8 Exposition of contents by the teacher, analysis of competences, explanation and demonstration of capacities, skills and knowledge in the classroom.
- M11 Personalised attention and in small groups. Period of instruction and/or orientation carried out by a tutor with the aim of reviewing and discussing the materials and topics presented in the classes, seminars, readings, completion of assignments, etc.
- M12 Set of written and/or oral tests used in the initial, formative or summative evaluation of the student.
- M13 Group preparation of readings, essays, resolution of problems, seminars, papers, dossiers, etc., to be presented or delivered in theory classes, practical classes, and/or small group tutorials.
- M14 Student's study: individual preparation of readings, essays, problem-solving, seminars, works, reports, etc. to present or deliver in the theoretical classes, practical classes and/or small group tutorials.

Comments to the Assessment System:



- Extraordinary case of online classes.

If classes had to pass to the online system, attendance would not be compulsory (although it would be convenient) and mere attendance would not count in the final grade.

The percentage of punctuation foreseen for the mere attendance will increase the percentage of participation.

In online classes only the student's participation will be taken into account (in addition, of course, the percentage corresponding to the practices and the exam).

However, the percentage corresponding to the mere attendance of the face-to-face classes developed up to that moment will be considered.

Online participation will be valued:

- 1) Taking into account the interventions of the students in the online classes themselves, with the corresponding records or notes.
- 2) Considering virtual tutorials through the UCVnet virtual campus or online sessions through Teams developed as a group or individual tutorial.
- 3) Taking into account the interventions in the forum, which will be enabled created on the UCVnet platform to raise and answer questions on the agenda.
- 4) Emails or messages received asking questions about the subject's syllabus.

- The final exam (to be carried out within the official exam period), either in person or online through UCVnet (moodle), will be a theoretical-practical test type questionnaire, as planned.
