Observations

For some of the presentations, students will be assigned a topic, whereas in other cases they will be able to choose from a list of options. All presentations will have a limited duration (4 to 6 minutes for individual presentations, 6 to 10 for group presentations). Groups will be made up of up to 4 students, all of whom must take part in the oral presentation. Some of the presentations require searching for material or information, and thus must include bibliography. Points will be awarded for originality, clarity, content, coherence, grammar, range of vocabulary and pronunciation. Some of the oral presentations will be delivered during class time, in person, whereas others will be recorded and uploaded to the platform by the students, as assigned by your lecturer. The final presentation will be delivered in person on the date of the subject's final exam, and will be individual.
