Observations

1.- The regular assessment for this subject is based on three grading elements:

- Objective test, which may consist of developing a topic; answering a set of short-answer questions; or a multiple-choice exercise (60% of the grade)
- Group work (20% of the grade)
- Individual work and participation (20% of the grade)

Students who cannot meet the minimum attendance requirement of 50% of the teaching sessions will take a single (alternative or exceptional) assessment. This option must be requested by the student from the course instructor in writing, and a response to their request will be sent in writing.

In this case, the exam will consist of the following three exercises:

- A written essay on a randomly selected topic and five short-answer questions, which will account for 60% of the final grade.
- A multiple-choice test (30 questions, with three answer choices; incorrect answers will be penalized) which will account for 30% of the final grade.
- An analytical-critical commentary on an anthropological text, which will account for 10% of the final grade.

2. -To pass the course, it is necessary to pass each of the assessments. The grades obtained will only be valid for one academic year. Therefore, if the course is failed, the grade for any of the assessments will not be carried over to subsequent enrollments or exam periods, and all the requirements for passing the course must be repeated.

3. -Attendance. Absences must be justified in person on the first day the student returns to class after the absence. After this deadline, any justification will be rejected. Documentary evidence of the incident that prevented attendance at the class session must be provided. Unverifiable incidents will not be accepted.

VERY IMPORTANT: Under no circumstances should you notify the instructor in advance of your absence. Justifications will not be accepted via email, platform message, or virtual tutoring. These



types of communications will not be considered.

CRITERIA FOR THE USE OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI): Students must use AI ethically, keeping in mind that it may be used for research purposes, but always with proper citation of its use. AI may not be used to record or transcribe any material from lectures or to delegate to it the completion of tasks for which students are responsible, as outlined by the instructor.

4. -Criteria for awarding honors: Honors will be awarded to students who have obtained a grade of 9.5 or higher, provided they have demonstrated a clear interest in the subject, actively participated in lectures, completed their assignments with excellence, and undertaken additional or in-depth work on the topics, including readings, essays, etc.

The number of distinctions awarded may not exceed 5% of the students enrolled in a subject unless enrollment is less than 20, in which case only one distinction may be awarded. (Royal Decree 1125/2003).

Observations

SYNCHRONICITY

As this is a "synchronous" online degree, students will not be exempt from regularly attending live online sessions. While these sessions will be recorded to provide some flexibility, students will be responsible for the grade reduction resulting from not submitting assignments completed during the session on time.

1.- ASSESSMENT

Continuous assessment will be based on the activities proposed in the classroom or on the teaching platform.

The final exam may consist of any of the following three options: a multiple-choice test, essay questions, short-answer questions, or an oral exam.

To pass the course, in addition to meeting the synchronous attendance requirement (at least 50%, with or without justification), students must have passed the different assessment components separately:

- Active participation, individual work, and practical exercises (20%);
- Group work (0.5%), periodic assessments via questionnaire (0.00%-5.00%)
- and the objective test or exam (70%).



Detection of plagiarism or transcription of AI text without citation in any of the assignments will result in a grade of 0 for the exercise.

Submissions outside the deadline and timeframe established on the platform will not be accepted.

Assignments submitted by email, virtual tutoring, or platform message will not be graded under any circumstances.

Criteria for opting for a **SINGLE ASSESSMENT** (alternative or exceptional) is available for students who, for documented and justified reasons, cannot meet the minimum attendance requirement of 50% of the teaching sessions.

This option must be requested by the student from the course instructor in writing, and a response will be sent to the request in the same manner.

The exam will consist of the following three exercises:

- A written essay on a randomly selected topic, and five short-answer questions, which will account for 60% of the final grade.
- A multiple-choice test (30 questions, with three answer choices; incorrect answers will be penalized) which will account for 30% of the final grade.
- An analytical-critical commentary on an anthropological text, which will account for 10% of the final grade.

To pass the course, it is necessary to pass each of the assessments. The grades obtained will only be valid for one academic year. Therefore, if the course is failed, the grade for any of the assessments will not be carried over to subsequent exam periods or retakes, and all the requirements for passing the course must be repeated.

2.- CRITERIA FOR THE USE OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI) Students must use AI ethically, bearing in mind that it may be used for reference, but always with proper citation of its use. AI may not be used to record or transcribe any material from lectures or to delegate to it the completion of tasks for which students are responsible, as outlined by the professor.

Citation and Attribution Guidelines:

- All use of AI tools must be explicitly declared in the submitted document (e.g., in a footnote or appendix).
- The name of the tool, the purpose of its use (e.g., grammar check, organization of ideas, writing example), and the section of the work in which it was used must be indicated.
- The responsible use of AI will be evaluated as part of the criteria for originality and academic integrity.

Students may not use AI to:

- Record or transcribe, in whole or in part, any classroom activity in order to obtain AI-generated summaries or notes.
- Generate text for assignments related to the activities.
- Submit AI-generated work as their own.
- Provide AI with questions, exercises, or assessments to obtain automatic responses.

Under no circumstances will assignments be accepted after the deadline or the timeframe established on the platform. Assignments submitted via email, virtual tutoring, or platform messages will not be graded.



Grades are valid for only one academic year. Therefore, if a student fails the course, the grade for any assessment will not be carried over to subsequent enrollments or exam periods.

3.- Criteria for the Awarding of Honors Distinction (Matrícula de Honor):

The distinction of "Matrícula de Honor" may only be awarded to students who have demonstrated excellence in all competencies and learning outcomes, have shown outstanding interest in deepening their knowledge of the subject by participating actively in class, requesting supplementary readings, completing extraordinary assignments, regularly attending in-person office hours, etc., and have obtained a final grade equal to or higher than 9.0.

The number of "Matrículas de Honor" awarded may not exceed 5% of the students enrolled in the group in the corresponding academic year, unless the number of enrolled students is fewer than 20, in which case only one "Matrícula de Honor" may be awarded.

The criteria for awarding the "Matrícula de Honor" will be applied in accordance with the guidelines established by the instructor responsible for the course, as detailed in the "Observations" section of the assessment system in the course syllabus.

In accordance with the regulations governing the assessment and grading of subjects in force at UCV, the distinction of "Matrícula de Honor" (Honours with Distinction) may be awarded to students who have achieved a grade of 9.0 or higher. The number of "Matrículas de Honor" (Honours with Distinction) may not exceed five percent of the students enrolled in the group for the corresponding academic year, unless the number of enrolled students is fewer than 20, in which case a single "Matrícula de Honor" (Honours with Distinction) may be awarded.

Exceptionally, these distinctions may be assigned globally across different groups of the same subject. Nevertheless, the total number of distinctions awarded will be the same as if they were assigned by group, but they may be distributed among all students based on a common criterion, regardless of the group to which they belong. The criteria for awarding "Matrícula de Honor" (Honours with Distinction) will be determined according to the guidelines stipulated by the professor responsible for the course, as detailed in the "Observations" section of the evaluation system in the course guide.

Learning activities

The following methodologies will be used so that the students can achieve the learning outcomes of the subject:

- M1 Teacher presentation of contents, competency analysis, explanation and demonstration of capacities, abilities and knowledge in the classroom (presentential modality).
- M2 Teacher-supervised groupwork sessions: case studies, diagnostic tests, problems, fieldwork, IT room, visits, data searches, libraries, web, Internet, etc. Building knowledge significantly through interaction and student activities (presentential modality).
- M4 Application of interdisciplinary knowledge.



M6 Personalized attention in small groups. Training and/or orientation period by a teacher aimed at revising and discussing the materials and topics presented in the lessons, seminars, lectures, assignments, etc.

M7 Set of oral and/or written tests employed in initial, training or summative assessment of the student.

M8 Group preparation of readings, essays, problem resolution, seminars, assignments, reports, etc. to be presented or handed in during theory lessons, practical lessons and/or tutoring sessions in small groups. Tasks done on the platform or other virtual spaces.

M9 Students' independent study: individual preparation of readings, essays, problem resolution, seminars, assignments, reports, etc. to be presented or handed in during theory lessons, practical lessons and /or small-group tutoring sessions. Tasks on the platform or other virtual spaces.
